Programme Content

- Plant identification
- Plant names
- Pests, diseases, disorders, and their control
- Weeds and how to control them
- Safe use of agrichemicals
- Plants – their life cycles and how they function
- Soils and fertilisers
- Plant propagation (seeds, cuttings, division, grafting).

- Basic gardening techniques
- Planting and maintaining annuals, perennials, and shrubs
- Preparing and using potting mix
- Maintaining plants in a glasshouse.
